A Victorian Christmas Cracker: Teacher Information Pack

Overview

Step back in time to Victorian York at Christmas in this special festive workshop. Enjoy a one-man performance of Charles Dicken's **A Christmas Carol** on our snow-covered Victorian street and discover the origins of some of our most treasured Christmas traditions.

Session fees

£7.50 per pupil. For groups of 24 or less, there is a flat fee of £180 per workshop.

What to expect

In this session, your pupils will:

- Enjoy a 30-minute theatrical performance of Charles Dicken's A Christmas Carol.
- Explore Kirkgate, our Victorian street, to find out about Victorian Christmas traditions and how these are similar, or different, to those of today. Notes for teachers will be provided to support this activity.
- Make their own festive **Victorian cracker**, complete with **sugar mouse**, to take home with them.

Our **A Victorian Christmas Cracker** workshop is led by an expert member of our Schools Learning Team.

Curriculum links

Our **A Victorian Christmas Cracker** workshop can be used to cover the following curriculum areas:

Key Stage Two

Pupils should be taught about:

- A local history study.
- A study or an aspect or theme in British history that extends pupils' chronological knowledge beyond 1066.



Workshop outline - *single class of up to 33 pupils*

Time	Activity
10.00-10.25am	Arrival at York Castle Museum. Pupils will store their belongings and receive a welcome briefing from the session lead.
10.25-11.00am	Pupils will take a seat in the snowy streets of Kirkgate for a one- man theatrical performance of Charles Dicken's A Christmas Carol .
11.00am- 12.05pm	 Pupils will split into two groups and alternate between the following activities: Kirkgate Christmas Trail Pupils will explore Kirkgate and find out what Christmas celebrations were like for the inhabitants of Victorian York. This is a self-led activity. Notes for teachers will be provided in advance of the workshop. Victorian Cracker Craft Pupils will discover the origins of Christmas Crackers, before making their own, complete with sugar mouse, to take away with them.
12.05-12.15pm	Conclusion and workshop evaluation.
12.15pm onwards	Visiting groups can choose to have lunch at York Castle Museum and/or make a self-guided visit to the rest of the site.

Key vocabulary

A Christmas Carol: about the performance

A Christmas Carol will be performed by Chris Cade, a freelance actor and storyteller in educational theatre.

Chris will take on the role of narrator, Scrooge, and the ghosts of Bob Marley, Christmas Past, Christmas Present, and Christmas Yet to Come.

A Christmas Carol: audience participation

There are opportunities for pupils to take part in the performance as specific characters. You may wish to select pupils for roles in advance of the workshop or ask for volunteers on the day.

The following roles are available, some of which have optional speaking parts:

Character	Notes
Bob Cratchit	Bob Cratchit will be invited up twice during the performance to sit at a desk with Scrooge, once at the start of the performance and once at the end. The character will be required to look busy and can speak if desired.
Mrs Cratchit	Non-speaking role.
Tiny Tim Cratchit	Tiny Tim Cratchit will give the final line of the performance, "God bless us, everyone!".

Martha Cratchit	Non-speaking role.
Belinda Cratchit	Non-speaking role
Peter Cratchit	Non-speaking role.
Scrooge's nephew Fred	This character has one line to speak when prompted to do so by Scrooge, ' <i>Merry Christmas Uncle</i> '.
Gentlemen collecting for the poor and destitute	These characters will be invited to shake their collecting tins and to be disappointed when Scrooge doesn't make a donation.
Scrooge's fiancé Belle	Non-speaking role.
Little boy in the street	When asked by Scrooge ' <i>What's today?</i> ', this character will respond ' <i>Christmas day</i> '.
Queen Victoria	Non-speaking role.

Costume, in the form of appropriate headgear, will be provided for characters to wear during the performance. Tiny Tim Cratchit will also be given a crutch as a prop.

Pupils will also have the option of acting as carol singers in the street towards the end of the performance. Carol sheets for the following hymn will be provided on the day:

"God rest ye merry gentlemen, let nothing you dismay For Jesus Christ our saviour was born on Christmas day To save us all from Satan's power when we have gone astray Oh, Tidings of comfort and joy, comfort and joy Oh, Tidings of comfort and joy, comfort and joy." There are no loud noises during the performance. The usual sound effects and lighting changes on Kirkgate will be suspended during the performance.

Pupils will watch the performance seated on the main street in Kirkgate. Cushions will be provided for seating, as well as benches for accompanying adults.

Dress like a Victorian

To make your A Victorian Christmas Cracker workshop extra special, your class could make their visit to York Castle Museum dressed in period clothing.

If you are planning to dress up, then here are some ideas which you might like to try:

- Boys
 - Dark trousers
 - A plain or pinstriped shirt
 - A neckerchief or knitted scarf
 - A plain waistcoat
 - Dark shoes
 - A flat cap
- Girls
 - A simple dress or skirt that goes below the knee, preferably plain, or with small flowers, or pinstripes
 - A plain blouse
 - A straw boater or headscarf
 - A knitted or fabric shawl
